

HEAT WAVE TAKES NINETEEN LIVES IN MIDWEST

BLASTS SWEEP DRY PRAIRIES
Six Die in Indiana and Many More Killed in Canada

LIVESTOCK CRISIS
Bridge Wrecked by Wind in Saskatoon; Mercury Reaches 105

CHICAGO, June 19. (P)—The second heat wave of the summer parched the midwest today, claiming at least 19 lives.

Other states to report deaths directly traceable to the heat wave included Wisconsin 2, Iowa 2, Minnesota 2, and downstate Illinois 1.

At Saskatoon, Sask., a heat-created whirlwind wrecked an overhead bridge and crashed Lloyd Coburn to death under the debris.

Numerous readings near or above 100 were reported in mid-America today. Even in Chicago, with its cooling breezes from Lake Michigan the temperature rose to 93 at 1 p.m.

CHICAGO, June 19. (P)—The second sizzling heat wave in two weeks scorched the midwest today, with thermometers soaring to the high 90s and over 100 degrees.

Northerly breezes blew in from the lake to afford some relief in the Chicago area, but in surrounding sections the mercury rose above the 100 degree mark.

The United States Weather bureau reported that relief probably would arrive Wednesday night. Today and tomorrow the forecast said, would be almost as hot as during the heat wave two weeks ago when new records were set.

St. Paul Brewer Released More Than 24 Hours After Kidnapers Receive Ransom from Manager
William Hamm Picked Up by Inspector and Friend Near Wyoming, Minn., and Rushed Home

ST. PAUL, June 19. (P)—William Hamm, multi-millionaire brewer and businessman, was released today by a gang of five or six kidnapers, including a man resembling Verne Sankey, after payment Saturday of ransom "somewhat less than \$100,000," Hamm said in an interview today.

Hamm revealed that he was kept in the second story of a house, located about eight hours driving from the Twin Cities. After the three men who kidnaped him had been driving about two hours, they were met by another automobile and Hamm was forced to sign four notes.

AMBERJACK II CRUISES NORTHWARD
President Holds Wheel as Sturdy Schooner Speeds Through Angry Seas Off New England Coast.

WITH PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT, AT NANTUCKET, Mass., June 19. (P)—Drenched by sweeping Atlantic waves which blocked progress of the vacation schooner Amberjack II, President Roosevelt put into this little port today after battling a northeast storm off Cape Cod.

The president was en route to Provincetown on his vacation sail up the New England coast when the little schooner ran into a second severe storm. Mr. Roosevelt, at the wheel, headed the vessel into the teeth of the whistling wind for three hours before he finally was forced to abandon the attempt to continue to Provincetown.
